

Chairman, PNASF Speaks

The hunger of food can be mitigated by food security, nutrition can be augmented by the remedial measures on nutrition security, and health can be protected and improved by the intake of necessary food which play a dominant role. But the hunger of knowledge and science on biology and agriculture can not be mitigated by any measure but will remain alive with continued research as

long as human beings will survive on earth.

In these years, six billion people will demand for food and the scientists as well as the farmers will continue to explore more food on soil and in water for the future generation. In search for food, scientists have utilized food crops and continue to research on underutilized crops for food, nutrition and health.

In the present and upcoming scenario, the horticulture is emerging as the second line of defense in the food domain both in the developed and developing countries. The horticulture sub-sector is growing in its importance in contributing substantially to food security, in providing adequate nutrition to the people and is preventing non-communicable diseases like some cancer, diabetes, blood pressure, obesity etc. With the growing knowledge on nutraceutical values of fruits and vegetables, and the breeding and improvement of vitamin or mineral specific fruits or vegetables have brought tremendous hope on the production and consumption of these crops. In addition, the studies on medicinal crops have shown great potential on its medicinal values for medical health.

Apart its usefulness mentioned above, the importance of horticulture lies in its capacity to produce much more food, vitamins, minerals, fibers and mineral water per unit area and per unit time as compared to other crops. The processing of horticultural products have opened wide opportunities and brought in big value addition to food. The present growing trend of supply and of market chain stores and the establishment of fresh and processed food chain stores have shown tremendous growth of horticulture industry both in the developed and developing world. The horticulture provides much needed opportunity for employment and income generation.

It is opportune time to diversify agriculture and invest in horticulture. The Indian National Horticulture Mission has taken appropriate steps in this direction. We expect both the national and international organizations to take lead and guide. We look forward to the support and contribution of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. Likewise, the non-government organizations like the GrobalHort, International Society for Horticulture Science, Vegetable Science International Network and others could augment the steps on horticultural research and development and assist in strengthening the linkages among the stake holders.

In this context, the Dr. P. N. Agricultural Science Foundation (PNASF) and Vegetable Science International Network (VEGINET) along with other national and international organizations have taken timely action to organize the International Conference on Horticulture (ICH-2009) scheduled during November 9-12, 2009 in Bangalore which will examine and identify the growing impact of horticulture on livelihood security and economic growth.

About 815 million people suffer from hunger and malnutrition, mostly in the developing world. By 2020, the developing world is expected to face the overwhelming challenge of 97.5% increase of population; moreover, the developing countries will face serious challenge with its trend of major shift in population from rural to urban areas. According to WHO an estimated 334 million children in developing countries are malnourished. In 2020, one out of every four children in these countries will still be malnourished. It is recognized that modern agriculture must diversify production and achieve sustainable higher output to supplement food security. In order to release the pressure on cereals as well as to improve upon the human nutrition through consumption of other nutritious crops, diversification in cropping pattern provides better option. The increased production and consumption of vegetables with its wide adaptation and provider of important nutrients (especially vitamins and minerals), offer promise for the future. According to FAO/WHO, recent experimental evidences have shown that, adequate consumption of fruits and vegetables prevent some noncommunicable diseases such as cancer, diabetes, blood pressure, obesity etc., Vegetables are high in productivity than other crops and provide more food and nutrition per unit time and area of land.

Visit to the Agricultural Research Institutes in Bulgaria

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT SUPPORT

PNASF/SUN/WD-SHG/2005: Promotion Of Rural Women Self Help Group Through Dairy Development Project

Members of the monitoring team visited the project site of the Self Help Group on 21.12.2008 and assessed the present status of the project. The findings have been summarized in table -1. The milk yield of the mother cows varied from 4-10 litres per day which is being sold to the milk cooperative society @Rs12/lt. Out of five female calves supplied to the beneficiaries along with the mother cows, one female calf is of six month old, three calves are one year old and one is dead. Of these, one female calf has been inseminated and the remaining are ready for insemination. The three new born female calves are healthy and are 4-6 month old now. Five mother calves are due to deliver during Jan – Mar 2009 and one cow has been inseminated recently. By the end of 2008, seven out of ten beneficiaries owning one original mother cow each, would be the proud owners of two new milching cows, providing them with assured livelihood security.

The beneficiaries showed satisfaction and happiness with the ownership of the project and the implementation team confirmed very good progress of the project during the period under report.

PNASF/MHPS/DES/2008-09/Biological Science and Nutrition Project

During the period of reporting it was the fifth cropping season for the activities at the Middle Higher Primary School (MHPS), Geddalahalli and the first cropping at the Daffodils English School

(DES), Sanjayanagar. The MHPS is the school of the Government of Karnataka, whereas the DES belongs to the private sector. Both the schools are located in the urban area of Bangalore but the beneficiary students of the two schools have significantly different socio economic and knowledge background.

The programme of the ongoing cropping season was approved for both the schools- MHPS, Geddalahalli and DES, Sanjayanagar. Thirty (30) students from 5th, 6th and 7th standards were selected from both the schools. At DES, the students have filled the pre project questionnaire for evaluation of their awareness and knowledge of vegetables and fruits and nutrition . They were also briefed about growing vegetables in containers and they had practical classes about preparation of potting mixture and filling the bags with the mixture. They have sown the seeds of French bean, cowpea, radish, okra. The students have observed the growth pattern of different vegetables and vegetative and economic parts of these plants. At both the centers the crops are performing well and the students are excited about learning the plant growing.
